On May 6, the Bynum Front Porch Educational Grant awards were presented during the opening of the 2023 Friday Night Music series at the Bynum General Store. Through donations from the community and fundraising such as through the sales of Christmas trees, each year Bynum Front Porch gives grants to support students' college aspirations. This year, we were able to give grants to three very deserving recipients. Each student received \$1000.

All three students were a part of the AVID program at their respective high school and graduated in June. AVID, which stands for Achievement Via Individual Determination, is a program that helps students who have a desire to go to college and the willingness to work hard to get there, but may not have the means or opportunity to attend college.

Those selected for 2023 are Kaitlyn Barrows from Chatham Central High School, Alison Romero Cruz from Northwood High School, and Jennifer Garcia Torres from Jordan Matthews High School.

Kaitlyn Barrows graduated from Chatham Central High School. While a full time student, she also worked at Rufus' restaurant in Goldston. Kaitlyn is excited to begin the next stage of her life, when she begins attending North Carolina

Agricultural and Technical College (NCA&T) in the fall to earn her Bachelors in Animal Science. After she completes her undergraduate course work she plans to go to vet school at NC State University and become a veterinarian for large animals.

Alison Romero Cruz, or Ally as her friends call her, graduated from Northwood High School. She plans to attend NC State in the fall and major in Architecture while also minoring in Landscape Architecture. News from Friends of Lower Haw River State Natural Area (FLOHA!)

Haw River State Trail

Big news we're excited about – the new Haw River State Trail! Friends of Lower Haw advocated for this State Trail authorization and collaborated with Bill Holman of The Conservation Fund, Alamance County Assistant County Manager Brian Baker, and Alamance Parks Haw River Trail Coordinator Nolan Carter. This dream became a reality on June 9, 2023 with the Governor's signature on senate bill 100 (SB 100), the Authorize Haw River State Trail bill. Friends of Lower Haw's Gretchen Smith, Alamance County's Brian Baker, and Carolina Canoe Club's Bob Brueckner gave presentations in support of SB 100 at a Senate committee meeting in Raleigh. We appreciate the bipartisan support of state legislators for authorizing the Haw River State Trail, a concept for over 80 miles of land and paddle trails from Haw River State Park to Jordan Lake State Recreation Area. State Trail authorization must be approved by the NC General Assembly and signed by the Governor. In addition to giving this trail statewide recognition and marketing clout, State Trail authorization means the Department of Natural and Cultural Resources "shall support, promote, encourage, and facilitate the establishment of trail segments" and "the State may receive donations of appropriate land and may purchase other needed lands for the Haw River State Trail". State Trails are a unit of the State Park System, and by becoming a unit of the system it allows the State Parks Planning staff to put money, staff time and resources towards developing the state trail. The State Parks Planning staff will develop a master plan for the new Haw River State Trail and create an official blaze. Land Acquisition and Easements

Friends of Lower Haw has also been collaborating with The Conservation Fund, Triangle Land Conservancy, and State Parks Land Protection/Acquisition staff on identifying and reaching out to willing landowners along the Haw River corridor who may be interested in working with us on land acquisition and trail easements. We are excited that Triangle Land Conservancy has purchased 108 acres in the Haw River corridor, known as Chicken Bridge Forest. The purchase was made possible by the generosity of the Protzman Family of Bynum. Although the Chicken Bridge Forest property is not riverfront, this acquisition is a good first step for developing the Haw River State Trail in Chatham County.

Haw River Trail Feasibility Study

We are continuing our collaboration with Alta Planning + Design and Chatham County on the Haw River trail corridor feasibility study as part of a working group of the Haw River Trail Steering Committee. The study process included public engagement through an online interactive map and survey, and stakeholder meetings. In the survey, 79% of respondents said the development of the Haw River Trail in Chatham County is "very important" to them. The third and final working group meeting was scheduled for the end of July and a draft

report for public review is expected to be available in August. The final report is expected to be completed in September. The report includes project background, existing conditions, and recommendations for implementing the trail. River Warning System Project

Friends of Lower Haw is participating in a river warning system project to aid emergency responders in locating individuals on the Haw River calling for help. The Haw River in Chatham County will be the pilot project and the river warning system project includes a mile-marker system, notification system, and educational programming. Friends of Lower Haw's Gretchen Smith participated on the RISE-TJCOG stakeholder group that developed this project as part of a portfolio of projects for Chatham, Johnston, Lee, and Moore counties. Triangle J Council of Governments (TJCOG) is working with NCORR's RISE Program on priority projects that strengthen regional resilience by preparing for and mitigating against the effects of climate change. Duke Energy Foundation awarded a Duke Energy Resilience Accelerator Grant to support the development and implementation of priority projects identified in each RISE region's portfolio. The grant program will allow each region to kick-start all or part of a project. The river warning system was one of 10 projects selected for this competitive grant. The collaborative group for this project includes Friends of Lower Haw, Carolina Canoe Club, TJCOG (now known as Central Pines Regional Council), Chatham County Emergency Communications, Chatham County Emergency Management, North Chatham Volunteer Fire Department's swift water rescue, South Orange Rescue Squad's swift water rescue, U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, NC Office of Recovery and Resiliency, Piedmont Conservation Council, Chatham County Parks & Recreation's Trails and Open Space Planner, and Haw River Assembly's Haw Riverkeeper.



2023 Year of the Trail and Other News

We are excited about our partnership with the Great Trails State Coalition, a broad coalition of nonprofits, local governments, industry partners, and state agencies dedicated to advocating for more state funding for all types of trails in North Carolina. Thanks to the coalition's lobbying success, 2023 is the Year of the Trail! This statewide celebration marks the 50th anniversary of the 1973 North Carolina Trails System Act. This year will be the debut of the Great Trails State Day on October 21.

Haw River Through-Paddle

Friends of Lower Haw board member Matt Spangler took another 57-mile through-paddle over three days on the Haw River this past spring

with three friends, similar to one he took two years ago. The crew began their journey by putting in at High Rocks Road in Rockingham County and ending the first day at Glencoe. Day 2 of their trip was entirely in Alamance County and ended in Saxapahaw, where they enjoyed beers at a local brewery. Day 3 was Matt's favorite part of the trip, taking them into Chatham County and ending at Robeson Creek Canoe Access. Tip for this trip: take duct tape! Matt lost his camera on Day 1 of the trip, so not many wildlife photos on this through-paddle but some great river images with his iPhone. Bynum General Store Remembered by Walter 'Corkey' Harris

Walter 'Corkey' Harris remembers when his grandparents, Frank & Louise Harris, operated the Bynum General Store for 43 years. On display inside the store are some clothing items and other grocery artifacts on the shelves. Stop in and take a look!

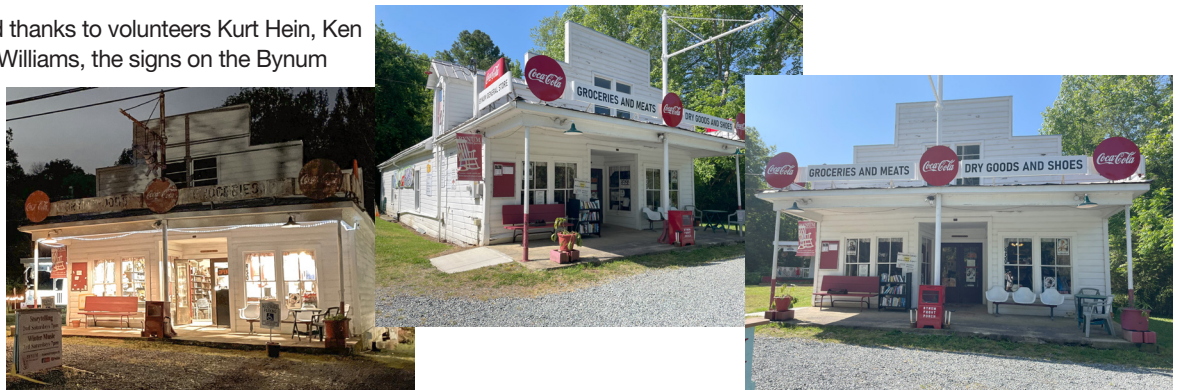
"...it was the things that mom and dad did, and my grandfather did here, to try to make a living but to provide for the people in the community. Now you have to understand at one time there was Mr Robert Moore's store, Mr C.E. Durham, that was Carrie Durham had the Rock Store, then Lewis Durham had the store in between us, on the corner of Hatley Road, that building is still standing. And there was this store up on this road... Billy Cooper had a store, currently Full Stack Plumbing, that was a station as well. You



could buy three brands of gasoline in Bynum at that time. And from time to time, we have gas wars. And we've sold gas for \$0.19 a gallon. Kind of hurts when we go to do it now. We sold ESSO gas. We sold men's shoes, work shoes up in the corner. We had some Khaki pants, a few shirts, overalls, dungarees, which would be jeans and a few ladies clothing items, but not many.... We sold Peters Mens Shoes. What you bought was sizes 7 through 10, 12. And people would come in and try on the shoe, like you do any store. They were always new in the box, take one out and have to try it on. If they didn't buy that, if that was the wrong size, put it back in the box and put it back on the shelf. But those shelves from the window forward is where all the shoes were kept. We sold hundreds of shoes here."

From our Bynum Outpost, we're offering a mix of guided and self-guided canoe and kayak trips on the Haw River. Our Bynum Lake trip is a self-guided exploration of the flatwater reservoir above the Bynum dam, where guests can weave between the maze-like islands

in search of native wildlife like minks, blue herons, and bald eagles. Our Twilight Tour, offered every Saturday evening, is a guided paddle of the reservoir under the setting sun and settling dusk. We also offer a guided paddle down the river from Chicken Bridge to the Bynum dam, an exciting and scenic Class II whitewater run!

The Bynum Outpost will be in operation each weekend in 2023 through at least September, and we plan to be up and running again next Spring! You can book any of our trips online at www.hawrivercanoe.com or drop by Bertha the Bus at the river access parking lot just off the 15-501 bridge!

The Haw River Assembly will launch the 33rd year of our Haw River Learning Celebration for fourth graders, on September 23 in Bynum at the Lower Haw River State Natural Area. Schools attend one of three locations in Chatham, Alamance, and Rockingham counties over 3 weeks and spend a day doing activities along the river, enjoying a picnic lunch and puppet show. The Learning Celebration this year will take place between September 23rd and October 13th. Volunteers work with our staff to make the program happen each year. Some volunteers come for a day, others join our “river camp” and set up a tent for the week. Come join us for an inspiring and fun day (or week) by the Haw River to volunteer as a guide – we provide the training! We also need volunteers to help with weekend field site set-ups and break-downs (Friday afternoon through Sunday afternoon) and to cook meals. We just finished our summer Swim Guide alerts for favorite swimming spots on the Haw in and near Bynum. We test whether levels of E-coli bacteria are safe for swimming using EPA guidelines and analyze the results to publicize each weekend between Memorial and Labor Days. Bynum and most of the Haw River and

Working to get **Bynum** on the **National Historic Register**

A group from Bynum is working to get Bynum on the National Historic Register. The group began the Bynum Historic Designation project by researching the process and hosting a community meeting in March 2023. At the meeting Sarah Woodard, the Survey and National Register Branch Supervisor of the State Historic Preservation Office, met with residents within the proposed historic boundary which encompasses about 60-70 structures. The meeting allowed residents to ask questions and understand what National Historic Registration is and would mean for the community.

The process to get on the National Historic Register involves multiple steps. The first step was successfully completed on June 8 when the National Register Advisory Committee approved adding Bynum to a “Study List” for historic designation. The next step will be fundraising efforts to secure a professional consultant to prepare formal National Register nomination documents and to purchase historical markers. As a part of the fundraising effort, the group is applying for grants and launching a GoFundMe campaign after Labor Day.. The GoFundMe page will invite all supporters in Chatham County and beyond who acknowledge that Bynum was one of the first textile mills in the state, that it has a rich cultural and socio-economic history, and that it remains, to this day, a vibrant community. Considering Bynum’s long history and continued vibrancy to this day, our community is a testament to the fact that history is not just
