Bynum Speak

Have you ever wondered what a Bynum-centric saying meant?

What did that Bynumite say?

What's Speed Rock?

What about the river level?

The Speed Rock was the major indication of the water level of the river; when water crested at/over the Speed Rock it meant that water could no longer be discharged from the mill turbines back into the river. The river water level was too high and the production of electricity was stopped. It also meant they had to close the gates to the race to avoid erosion of the race. At that time it was a manual process and Robert Hatley was the person responsible for closing the gates every evening when the mill closed. It was a constant process repairing the race due to erosion.

It's almost here, a Bynum PO Box waits for those of you who want a Bynum Address ~ it will soon be possible!!

The new Pittsboro Postmaster is able to open the PO boxes at the ball field that had been closed in previous years. It will be a few weeks before this can be achieved. The locks on the boxes may have to be changed and there may be a 1-time fee of \$25 for your Bynum PO Box Address. This will allow us to keep our Bynum identity and zip code, well worth the wait.

Anyone who now has door-to-door delivery and wants a Kiosk box, the Post Master requests that you use only 1 address for your Postal Mail. It is a reasonable request and would be a win-win situation for both parties. There are presently about 20 boxes that should be available. DURHAM EUBANKS ROAD



Roy & Beulah Plus Roy, Angela & Beulah



Roy Lee (Wesie) Jr & Beulah (Skin) Eubanks married in 1935 and both worked at the mill. Roy worked the 2nd shift as the Winding Room Supervisor. He worked for 50+ years until the mill closed. Beulah worked the 1st shift in the Winding Room for 50+ years and then went to UNC hospitals as a seamstress. She was nicknamed Skin for her slight build. They worked opposite shifts so one of them could watch the children. Beulah was a twin sister to Eulah. Roy and Beulah had two children – Roy III and Carolyn. Roy III married Cathy Campbell and their daughter Angela Flower is pictured with Roy Lee (Wesie) & Beulah (Skin) Eubanks.

Roy Jr's aunt was Flossie Durham. She married Manly Durham and lived across the street from each other.



Roy Hatley moved to Bynum a short 86 years ago from just down the way on HWY 64; he was two when his parents, Walt and Nora Hatley moved to Bynum.

Roy and his father cut wood off their property on Hwy 64 and pulled it by wagon and mules up the river road to sell the wood as firewood to the folks in Bynum. They also had a small farm in Bynum at the time and Roy sold milk and buttermilk to neighbors on the hill for two cents and five cents a bottle in the mornings before school. He also was the one who took a drag (a wooden sled-like apparatus) and a snaking mule to clear the roads of snow in Bynum during the winter (again, before going to school).... back when it snowed!

The State approached Roy about paving the road and naming it after him; their intent was to pave the road and make it a two lane road. Roy said that was a bit of overkill for just three houses; everyone could just wait on the first person on the road. That was a standard on the bridge back when cars would wait at either end of the bridge for the first car to enter the bridge. Two cars could pass, and did pass, but it was courteous and the normal practice just to wait it out and wave at the driver as the first car on the bridge exited. Two cars could pass, but it was a slower time then. Ron, (Roy & Rita's son) shared the bridge with a 16-wheeler when he was driving the school bus for Bynum. They each had to pull in the mirrors in order to pass.

The original Bynum road ran just in front of Roy's property; the current road came later. It was THE road before the bypass and the new bridge. You can still see the last remnants of the 'sidewalk' on the property known as the Warren Durham house.

A tale that gives us a big smile, cheek to cheek. Tushkins. Just talking to neighbors in Bynum, you may hear about the 1983 trademarked Tushkin, the scented squeezable greeting card. They were warehoused inside the Bynum mill and when the flames of the 2001 fire took down most of the mill, some Tushkins escaped. The boxes that kept them locked for transport were raised up into ashes. The boxes said "Tushkins, the Squeezable Greeting Card – with a special message on the back: "Sign it and say it from the bottom of your heart."



Some of the greetings were:

- "No buts about it, we're best friends."
- "I love you from the bottom of my heart."
- "Thanks for being 100% behind me."
- "We'll always be cheek to cheek."
- "Thanks for making sure I was well-reared."
- "Happy New Year and Bottoms Up!"

Former Bynum resident and Tushkinologist Molly Matlock wrote "Dark brick columns and ash surrounded the burnt out ruins of a once solid pillar of a once vibrant community. We were to learn later that it required five tries for a mysterious arsonist to reduce the mill to this unseemly state." During the fire Tushkins took refuge behind some of the walls and pillars of the mill. The colony of Tushkins had various ethnic features, both male and female genders were represented. Their names were Foxy, Sweets, Hunk, Cool, Gent, QT, Sigh, & Teardrop. Before the mill area was transformed into its current state, Tushkins could still be found on occasion as a delightful reminder of days passed and the sad reality of fire. At one point Molly said, "There were zillions of them lying there. All these smiling, happy little – well, you can imagine. I picked one up. "Look," I said. "They're jolly little bottoms with feet." Some lost their identifiable box, their straw hats and many even suffered bodily loss. Yet, they were carried into Bynum homes and displayed with love.

Jerry Partin the last Bynum Post Master and Bynum General Store operator is quoted to say, "Well, the mill started out as a textile mill. Most of our families worked there back when Bynum was bustling with its own movie theatre, five stores, a school, restaurant, game room; it was full of life then. When we were kids, we'd eat at each other's house. If we got in trouble there, our parents would know about it before we reached home, and we'd get another spanking. In the later years, they began to make those large ceramic desk lamps you see in motels. Then, they stored models of the Roman Coliseum or something like that. And then came the Tushkins. I don't really know where they were made, but they definitely were stored in Bynum."

Fast forward to New Years Eve, 2016. Babette the Tushkin was lowered from the Bynum water tower – she joined the other Tushkins in the hearts of Bynumites – to give us stories to share, laughter to bind us, and to enhance the sweet smell of Bynum. Like another Babette said, from Babette's Feast, "Throughout the world sounds one long cry from the heart of the artist: Give me the chance to do my very best." Bynum is the very best of the finest artist. What do you think is our Babette's greeting? Maybe it's, "Bynum does not leave anyone behind".

Planning the event takes many hours, which is a manageable labor of love for a few dedicated people, but actually putting the event on the field and being ready to greet and take care of 1,500 people over just 5 hours takes an army over a 3 day period. This past year we found that our army was way too small to be effective and unfair to those wonderful folks who did help out. SO, this year must be different and we'll need your help.



Over the next few months we will be putting together a really strong volunteer team. We will need lots of folks to lend us a hand, both over the course of the actual weekend of ClydeFEST and in advance. We ask you to think of groups you know who have willing and eager hands (civic groups, Scouts, sports teams, student art groups, pep clubs, church groups, corporate volunteer opportunities, etc.) and help us

make contact with them. We hope that the fall date will have fewer schedule conflicts than spring, so more groups will be available. We will also need to ask all of our non-profit participants to lend us a few volunteers from their ranks as well. (We will have more specifics on that in the future.) Once we have all of the smiling faces (and muscles) in place to pull it off, together we'll make ClydeFEST magic!

So please go ahead and mark your calendars, let me know that you will be there and start spreading the word that ClydeFEST is coming. And please also give some serious thought to helping us put together the BEST and MOST FUN volunteer crew in Chatham County history!
